
Propositions

- H1: Members of religious groups that fear state intrusion on religious practices will oppose government surveillance.
 - H1a: Members of religious sub-communities that view wealth as divinely granted will favor corporate surveillance.
- H2: Members of marginalized religious groups will oppose government surveillance, while accepting surveillance through religious institutions.
 - H2a: Members of marginalized religious groups that recognize or fear cooperation between state and corporate actors will oppose corporate surveillance.
 - H2b: Members of marginalized religious groups that experience consequences from workplace surveillance will oppose corporate surveillance at large.


Propositions

- H3: Members of religious groups with more pervasive surveillance will accept more surveillance overall.
- H4: Experience with pervasive surveillance may diminish awareness of: (a) religious surveillance and (b) corporate surveillance.
